Mark Wallinger | spacetime

May 20 - June 28, 2003

We are delighted to be able to present Mark Wallinger's first solo gallery exhibition in Germany. Wallinger questions social and national identities, often with a keen and subversive sense of irony. In "spacetime" the artist takes a site of recent German history as the starting point for his investigations.

Opening: Saturday, May 17, 2003

"spacetime continues my preoccupation with thresholds. It is a meditation on the borders of sense using a roadsign and two photographs of Glienicke bridge.

"Henceforth space by itself, and time by itself, are doomed to fade away into mere shadows, and only a kind of union of the two will preserve an independent reality." (Hermann Minkowski)

Spacetime was a term coined by the mathematician Minkowsky in his wish to make Einstein's theory of relativity available to a wider audience. Since there are three dimensions of space, and one dimension of time, spacetime has four dimensions.

Space and time as experienced by us everyday are the defining conditions of our existence; they give us our measure and our identity. Space and time have their own discreet systems of representation. To understand otherwise is to will a kind of synesthenia: the displacement of one kind of sensory experience for another.

Like being in two places at the same time, East and West synchronised their watches and lived for awhile in a parallel universes. My time and space are the name on a sign, a line which then denotes itself as no time / no space / no thing but this: Mark Wallinger. (I have no business being here.) The entry and exit to this place is the time it takes to expose the film - the instant I pressed the shutter photons hit the photographic emulsion at the speed of light. Whether the shutter was set at 1 / 2 / 4,000 of a second is immaterial. The two cars cross the divide simultaneously. If they could reach the speed of light at the border they would disappear like the deLorean in Back to the Future. Seeking to escape the nightmare of history and waking up to oblivion."
